Esukuta Ceremony

On July 31st WILK's Esukuta borehole was officially opened and blessed. People celebrated in grand style, while taking seriously the call to care for the well and use it to better the lives of their families to honor the memory of John Fields, to whom it was dedicated, through the generous donation of John's mother and brother. Now the clean water is transforming Esukutans' lives, improving the health of people and livestock – no more stomach aches or cholera from drinking the salty, dirty water they used to scoop from the dry riverbed. The body condition of livestock has improved since they are no longer plagued by the stomach parasites from the dirty water they used to drink.

Education at every level

Since there are no other boreholes for at least 50 square miles near Esukuta, and no experienced committees closeby, WILK transported the Esukuta water management committee to Amboseli, inviting them to be trained by the experienced leaders of Ilmarba Borehole and visit their well. A few months later, we returned to train them again in Esukuta where the practical experience of managing their borehole revealed the wisdom of what Ilmarba leaders had taught them.



Livestock as a Business: A Remarkable and Innovative Group

Ilmarba Livestock Keepers joined WILK's Livestock as a Business (LAB) program in 2011. They are currently our most senior group. Their group was supposed to "graduate" this year, but they have proven themselves to be leaders whose successful livestock keeping has attracted 4 other groups to join: Olningo Women's Group, Iltuati Youth Group, Olepolos Group and Oshumu Group.

We want to share an innovative practice they've developed. Each LAB program cycle they have been loaned \$2000 which they use to purchase cattle for fattening over 6 months. The clever thing they do is to start marketing as soon as they leave the market.

Now for the best part: They choose beautiful, healthy animals which, as

they walk by, cause their neighbors to say, "Wow, I really need that cow" and thus the business begins. Ilmarba Group offers a monthly payment plan so people can "book" the cow of their choice, paying it off over time, with full payment due no later than June 1, before the WILK loan is due. This means that people with little cash can become cow owners, increasing their assets. The customers are often young men building their herds, widows, or those who suffered a recent family emergency. Since 2012, 8 people have benefited from this payment plan buying 48 cows, often as repeat customers.

Overall it was a great season, with average net profit of 40%, thanks to Livestock as Business Groups managing their animals well, monitoring both the availability of

members' individual herds, which is, after all, the main objective of this program.

Success stories abounded among our new groups, which included 2 women's groups: Loolakirr Esinyati Anna Women's Group and Lenkisem Enkishaiki Women's Group. Both made very good choices in the livestock market, took good care of their animals, despite being scorned by the men in their area, who didn't believe that women could do profitable livestock keeping. Did they ever prove them wrong! Loolakir made net profit of \$1260 on \$2000 and Lenkisem earned \$816 on \$2000, even after one cow died. Amazingly, Loolakirr ladies had no idea how much profit they had made since their illiteracy prevented them from doing the calculations. Part of their strategy was to squeeze the expenses as much as possible! For example, when they went to the market they used only 50 cents each for 3 people for food compared with some groups who spent \$5 each. They're proud of their success!


